Friends of the Library Meeting: February 1, Noon

Why?

Why do we still need fundraisers if we have school district tax money?

Why do we need renovations to our library?

Why do we even need a library?

These questions have been asked recently by various patrons and residents of Ripley, some of whom have never even been to our library. A short explanation will be attempted, but if you want more details, please visit the Ripley Public Library and ask questions. We welcome your involvement.

Why do we need fundraisers? Before the District vote for library funding was passed, the Ripley Library was on the verge of closing. The cost of maintaining the building, salaries (which are minimal at best, even now), new books, and utilities were quickly eating up any State funds available to us. State funding for libraries has been cut three consecutive years, and the Governor has proposed cuts for nine years of his administration. The Districting vote to help our library was a tremendous help, however, that money does not afford the funds for improvements to the library, programs to be presented to and for our residents, or the Summer Reading Program in which many of our children take part. The fundraising done by the Friends of the Library give the "extras" our library is able to offer.

Why do we need renovations? The construction project was a blessing in disguise. Unbeknownst to anyone, the two drop ceilings that were added decades ago put an additional five tons of weight on the original structure of the building. This caused some damage to the century old beams, which need to be repaired before we can begin to renovate. The cost of renovation and repairs of this magnitude is not covered by the District funding. And why do we need to renovate? The Ripley Library is one of the few sources of activity outside of some church youth programs and school. We need a place for teens and tweens to congregate, socialize, and learn. Designated rooms for our young people are part of the renovation project. A children's room/reading corner is also part of the plan. Knitters, crafters, quilters, and the sewing group need room to spread out their materials. Meeting rooms and social rooms will be available as well. This is a big, costly project, but one that benefits ALL of Ripley's residents.

Why do we need a library? Libraries need to evolve and change, which Ripley Library is doing. No longer are they just a place to check out a book. Our library provides free access to computers to everyone, adults, teens and youngster alike. The library provides enrichment classes and events. The library gives a venue for local artists to display their work, as well as programs for our preschoolers and beyond. If you haven't been to the Ripley Library recently you may be in for a surprise. There is oftentimes music playing, or even individuals practicing their instruments; there are board games and puzzles available; computer games being played; discussions about current books; people researching their family trees with Ancestry.com, available free at the library; and Rosetta Stone is attracting groups who want to learn a new language. Quilters practicing their craft and knitters making items, which the groups then donate for shelters and nursing homes, are busy each week.

In short, the library is a vibrant part of our community. Could we get along without it? Sure, but why would you want to? Those who have transportation can easily travel to Westfield or North East to use their libraries. For those who do not have easy transportation, they are left in a cultural desert. Learning, reading, and socializing is for everyone. Ripley Library is the library of choice for many people in surrounding communities because we are warm, friendly, relaxed and welcoming

Your support and participation is a vital part of the Ripley Public Library. We need you!

From the Director's Desk By Rhonda Thompson

Greetings to all of our Bookworm readers!!! I trust your winter is going well, since the weather has been balmy and we are very lucky peeps this year. Especially here at the library.

With the ceiling gone from the building we lose a great deal of heat through the roof. Board President Earl Freling has tarped off the circulation and computer area of the library to help keep the staff and patrons warm and toasty. It really has made a difference back there. We call it the warming station and it makes you feel like you are in a nice safe warm cocoon.

(Earl was fearful we might start molting. If this happens, you may see some beautiful butterflies in the library this spring. I am afraid for myself though... I will likely turn into a hairy moth.)

Although things may be quiet on the outside, we are very busy behind the scenes here at the library. First of all, it is, of course, Annual Report time here and that means I am just a bit crazier than normal. Secondly, the renovations are coming up very fast and the Board will be deciding on a contractor for the job soon. The real crazy thing is, I am already working on phase 2 of the process and phase 1 has not even been started yet. My mind begins to travel faster than the rest of me can keep up.

There is so much to prepare for the up-

coming renovations. We have to get a storage container to hold all of our bookshelves, books, desks, tables etc. while the crew works. We will try to remain open as much as possible and work out of the back room. We will set up the circulation computer and have the books out there. We may be able to have a couple of patron computers on the floor for use.

We will do what we can to keep meeting the needs of our patrons. I think we have done a pretty good job of it so far. I have had folks from the Library System tell me that other libraries would have just shut down as soon as things went awry, but we just did what we had to do and moved on. We are making it work.

We are still ordering new books and putting out about 100 new books per month and along with several movies. Be sure to check out the list in the newsletter for the new books and movies and of course all of the events that we are involved in.

February 1, 2020 is "Take your Child to the Library Day" and we have a special day planned for adults and kids alike. There will be a guessing game to see if the Ground Hog sees his shadow, kiddos can make a woodchuck mask (did you see how I just snuck both of the common names for the forecasting little rodent in the same sentence Hehe)? Stephanie is working on buttons; hopefully we will get some of those made as well. (continued Page 3)

We also need to give a hand to the Friends of the Library. They are hard at work planning four major events for you in the coming year. The first one is a fundraiser to be held this month on Valentine's Day at Meeder's Restaurant. The FOL is planning a wonderful bake sale to help raise money for the library events and to buy extras for the library. Please help them out by baking something for the sale. The goods can be dropped off here at the library until 5 pm on Thursday February 13th. Then we can all help them out by purchasing some of these wonderful treats. I think I will make fudge. What are you going to make? Right now they are setting funds away so we can purchase new furniture for the library when it gets renovated.

As Director, writing grants is a big part of my job. I have been doing a lot of this since we went district and began the capital project. Of course, we do not get every grant we ask for, but I keep trying. These grants provide what we cannot normally afford, such as the Summer Reading Program. We keep trying new things to make it work with less

money, but it is hard. So please when we can get a program here, take advantage of it and bring the kiddos in. Let's get our money's worth. Additionally, if anyone out there hears of a grant opportunity, please by all means get me the information so I can apply for it.

Writing grants can also get our name out there and lets other organizations know what we are trying to do. Therefore, we are planning to have a press conference in the rather near future. In fact, to get started with this, the Library Board has set a date of February 15, 2020 at 12:30 pm to plan how to do this properly. We will set a date for the press conference and hope we can get our politicians and big supporters to be here. This will get us in the news and let everyone know what good changes we are trying to bring to our community. If you have experience with this type of procedure and would like to help us newbies out, please join us for this very important workshop.

Remember, we are working hard to bring the best we can give to you, our patrons and supporters. Yay for Ripley as we move onward and upward into 2020! See everyone at the library.

February 10, Please Advocate for New York State Libraries

Did know running libraries is very political? Well, it is and libraries rely on State Aid for a good portion of their funding. How this works is the State budget is prepared with monies allocated to the many Library Systems throughout the State. How much each Library System gets is determined by how many Libraries they are in charge of. For instance, Chautauqua and Cattaraugus Library System, the one we belong to, has 38 libraries in the many towns throughout both counties. We are one system spread over a large area. Other systems have less real estate to cover, but a larger population.

Once again, Governor Cuomo has proposed his budget with millions cut to the libraries throughout all of New York State. Library Aid has been cut by \$4 million dollars. That really is not a lot in a State budget, but it is a lot to the libraries. The biggest cut is for the construction aid. Now this one hits Ripley Public Library directly. Since we are mostly relying on this aid to provide the grant money for our renovations, having a cut in that area may seize our ability to move forward with changes and updates for us.

You can help by joining a letter writing campaign. Legislators have informed the Library Systems that handwritten letters, not phone calls or emails work the best. Explain briefly in a letter what the library has meant for you and why the aid is so important to your community. Remember, libraries are education and so much more. Especially libraries in small towns like ours; the library is really the community center.

Monday February 10, 2020 is the day after the full moon so I am calling it the Full Moon Letter Writing Campaign Day. Please come in around noon and write letters to our State Representatives. We will have paper, pens, envelopes and stamps available. We just need you to help write the letters. If we get enough help, maybe we can order pizza from Wings and Things to give us energy for all the letters.

My Choice By Sharon McIntosh The Quilt by T. Davis Bunn

The first paragraph, after the title, that is, had me hooked.

It reads: "Once upon a time, not so very long ago there was a little girl who grew up and had a family and tried to raise it as she thought the Lord would want. After a while, in the ways of this earth, she found herself growing old."

The "she" is Mary, the elderly matriarch of the town and surrounding area, known to all to be the best baker of cakes and pies, the most prolific maker of quilts, the best ear to turn to with a problem and the most "beautiful person I ever laid eyes on". Not because she was physically beautiful but because she always had time to listen and smile away others' cares.

Mary let it be known that she was going to make another quilt. Each resident, relative and acquaintance had their own private and sometimes not so private thoughts of why this was not a good idea. "I mean, really, at her age and just look at her hands, all swollen and deformed by arthritis, how could she even hold a needle, let alone cut and pull and tug and stitch and oh, I just don't know what possessed her to imagine she could even start such a project."

However, those who truly knew and loved Mary felt they needed to help her all they could. One by one, her two daughters in law, her neighbors and friends gathered in her cozy living room, sorted family clothing, chose colors, cut pieces, stitched patches and stretched the backing, batting and finally the pieced top on a quilting rack her eldest son, Jonas, had made for this very purpose.

As her friends sat in the cozy living room, Mary often reminded them that this was a thanksgiving quilt, a prayer quilt and that with each piece added and each stitch worked, they were to give thanks for something they had been taking for granted. Each woman found that even though they were spending time with Mary and the quilt, they felt more peaceful, more calm and at ease with their life after a visit with each other, all working toward a single purpose.

As the quilt neared its final border and binding, Mary took to her bed and just reminded the ladies, don't worry about me, just go out there and finish what we've started. They had Jonas tear down the quilt frame, set it up once again in Mary's bedroom so she could see the beautiful result of the work she had started and had lovingly help to finish.

At Mary's funeral, the quilt was on display to remind each one who had helped that they had, indeed finished what they started and knew it would have made Mary smile.
