Did Someone Say Renovation?

It has been just over a year since the Ripley Library first talked about renovating the current space, and just under a year since the suspended ceiling fell, precipitating the NEED for renovation. While a lot has gone into this project already, there is nothing visible happening, until now.

March will see the main library emptied of all shelving, books, chairs, tables—anything that moves will be moved out! The storage container is already in place, waiting for the go-ahead from the architect, the library will enlist the help of some of the prisoners of the SHOCK facility in Brocton to do the actual moving. The Ripley Library has used the help of these non-violent inmates several times in the past, always with great results.

After everything has been emptied out, work will begin on the repair to the main ceiling, and the two existing balconies. The Phase I changes will be a huge improvement to the functionality and beauty of this historic building, with more changes to come in the next few years.

The Chautauqua/Cattaraugus Library System members are amazed that our little library has stayed open through much of this process.

You are invited to stop by the library, come in, see the "bare bones" of the building. The library is OPEN during its regular hours until construction begins. Take this opportunity to visit, check out a book, borrow a video, and talk to the staff about what the new and improved library will be like. This is all being done for the benefit of Ripley Library patrons who come from all the surrounding communities, not just Ripley. Come be Amazed!

2020 United States Census

National Census Day is April 1st (no foolin'). In mid-March you will receive a notice to take part in the census, which takes place every ten years. You are encouraged to go online to fill out your census information. The Census Bureau DOES NOT release your information to any other agencies. It is safe to be counted and it is necessary to be counted.

"Data that is gathered from the census helps determine governmental district boundaries, ensures states are accurately represented in the U.S. House of Representatives, and is part of the formulas for how federal funding is allocated among social service agencies, highway planning, educational grants and other types of programs.

"The Constitution requires that everyone living in the United States participate in the census every 10 years. People of color, those living in poverty, people experiencing homelessness, rural communities, religious minorities and immigrant communities often go undercounted. Fear, mistrust and lack of awareness about the process are among the reasons some don't participate." (excerpt from the Catholic Legal Immigration Network, Inc. [CLINIC] website).

Individual census data is not shared with any other government agency. Vulnerable individuals, i.e. those who are in this country illegally, can safely be counted among the population, and SHOULD be counted.

Penn Writer's Group At Ripley Library

Penn Writer's member Mary Ellen Humphrey facilitates a weekly PennWriter's.Org writers group at the Ripley Pubic Library on Mondays from 10:30 AM to 11:30 AM. All are welcome.

What makes this writers group unique? The members have set an ambitious agenda for the coming year. Starting in January, we participated in our own micro-NANO project,* allowing six weeks to write first drafts of a new project, with a goal of 20,000 words. The drafts are not the completed manuscripts but rather a modest goal to jump-start our larger projects. This felt more manageable to the group rather than the traditional November goal of 50,000 words in 30 days. Happy to say, it is working! Each member has reached a reasonable goal with encouragement to continue and finish their manuscripts.

But there's more to the story. This project is the kick off for a year-long writing agenda, providing for members to complete their first drafts, workshop and edit those manuscripts, design and publish each book using Kindle direct publishing. Mary Ellen has published a number of books using CreateSpace which is now Kindle Direct Publishing, and will offer guidance and advice to the members as we continue with our writing projects. The ultimate goal is to launch our books jointly with a kick-off event and celebration party at the library in one year's timeframe.

It's not too late to start your project. Feel free to join us as we continue our year-long journey to reaching our dreams of holding in our hands the books in our hearts.

We Asked—You Responded

We wanted to know what you wanted to read about and several requests came in for historical stories about Ripley. Thank you to those who took the time to let us know what interests you! Herewith is a little history of the man who built the Hamilton "mansion."

Reprinted in part from The Ripley Review circa 1908:

Ripley Man State Senator

Assemblyman Charles M. Hamilton of Ripley, was nominated by acclamation to succeed Albert t. Fancher of Little Valley, as State Senator, at the Republican Senatorial convention held in Jamestown Friday afternoon. Harmony and enthusiasm were the characteristic features of the convention...

[Senator Albert T. Fancher is quoted as saying:] "Today we are to name a new man as our representative in the Senate, but he is not an untried man at Albany. He has made good at Albany during his two years service in the Assembly. He had a splendid acquaintance and friendship there. I am sure he will be satisfactory to you people. He is a young man of means and ability and has the courage of his convictions. We will all be proud of him, for he will be our senator as well as yours.

"I take great pleasure in nominating Charles M. Hamilton of Chautauqua for State Senator in the 51st District of New York."

The mention of Assemblyman Hamilton's name by Senator Fancher was the signal for a great demonstration, which continued for several minutes.

There was more applause for Hamilton and when the nomination was placed before the convention by Chairman Reed, a chorus of ayes resounded through the hall. [Hamilton's acceptance speech in part:]

"In the two years that I have represented the Second District of Chautauqua County in the Assembly I have endeavored to carry out as far as possible the wishes of a majority of the people of the district, and if I am elected to the office of Senator in November next, I will to the best of my ability further the interests of the people of this Senatorial district.

"The most difficult part of representing a constituency in either branch of the Legislature is not in voting in the manner they wish you to vote, nor in accomplishing the things they wish, but rather to ascertain what their desires *are* in the many matters which come before the Legislature. Fortunate indeed is the representative who can at all times know the sentiment of his district, and in this connection I wish to call your attention to the difficulty in determining between the true and manufactured sentiment of a constituency.

"For instance, during the past two years I have received a large number of telegrams and letters urging me to support or to oppose certain current legislation. Upon talking with the authorities of these communications I have found in great many cases that they themselves did not understand the object of the legislation in question but had written at the request of the secretary of some association, usually in the city of New York."

Charles Hamilton, from our little town of Ripley, served as a member of the New York State Assembly in 1907 and 1908; then was a member of the New York State Senate from 1909 until 1912; and then elected as a Republican to the United States Congress in 1913 and served until 1919.

It seems politics hasn't changed much in 112 years.

Travel Logue

A Trip to Loggerhead Marinelife Center in Florida

I recently visited friends in Juno Beach, Florida (in southeastern Florida). I had a lovely time and enjoyed the company, the weather and the activities. One activity stands out in my mind as one of the highlights of my week in the sunshine. It was a visit to Loggerhead Marinelife Center, located right in Juno Beach.

The center is an outdoor sea turtle hospital. They are also equipped with an indoor hospital where visitors can watch through large picture windows some of the medical procedures being performed. The turtles did not seem to be stressed, and to my untrained eye, appeared to intuit that they were being well cared for.

Outside, each turtle had his very own pool to recuperate in. Apparently, they are solitary creatures, so they



are not lonely when isolated in separate pools. Of course, I checked on that. It was great to see that the volunteers knew each turtle by name and were quite knowledgeable about each individual case.

Apparently, many of the patients become ill with a buoyancy problem. Others suffer from cuts to their carapace by boat propel-

lers. These are common health issues for sea turtles. Those with a buoyancy problem are not able to swim to proper depths to keep them healthy. Floating close to

the surface, they are prone to parasites and algae attaching to their shells, which the doctors and volunteers must then scrape off. The experts have devised a type of weight, which is attached to the turtle's shell in order to enable it to swim to more proper depths. This way the shell will more efficiently keep free of unhealthy growths. The sea turtles must surface for air and can swim below the surface



of the water for a half hour at a time. So they do need to come up for air, but while they are under water, they swim much deeper than you might expect.

Since I have returned to Western NY, my friends have informed me that Ballard and Bailey have been released back to the sea! Bon voyage to you both! May you live long and healthy lives! Volunteers, visitors and

people from the community all gather to see them off. I hear that a few tears are even shed at the releases. They tell a story of one sea turtle who returned to the hospital, not wanting to go back to the sea. Apparently, he will stay there as long as he wants.

If you ever travel to this part of Florida, Loggerhead Marinelife Center is a place you should visit. You won't forget your experience there.


They slowly gained respect if not acceptance from the local plantation owners and were able to make a life for themselves on the island.
