#### **Board Notes**

The Ripley Public Library Board of Trustees met on September 26 where the members talked about the continuing process of renovation. The construction of a custom circulation desk was discussed, along with the possibility of laminate flooring to be installed at the entrances to the library. With the framework and sheet rock completed, colors for the new look will be picked out soon.

Sexual harassment training is a requirement from the State and must be completed and signed off by each board member as well as the librarian and clerks no later than October 9th.

Discussion was held regarding a "grand re-opening" event when Phase I is completed. The date will be set when the finish date is determined.

# **October Gardening**

October brings cooler temperatures along with the need to prepare your garden for winter and make plans for your spring gardening.



- Divide crowded clusters of perennials
- Plant more spring bulbs
- Collect seeds from your favorite plants
- Cut back your perennial plants that have started to die back.
- Lay a heavy layer of mulch to protect tender perennials
- Clear away old vegetation.
- Plant onions and garlic now.
- Continue to water newly planted plants
- Repot your potted plants. Add new potting soil and increase your pot by one size before bringing them indoors.
- Mulch your beds and borders.
- Apply your second application of lawn fertilizer.
- This is a good time to prune "most" of your deciduous trees. Please take the time to research before you prune.
- Perform oiling, sharpening and sanding maintenance on your garden tools.
- Work on your power equipment including filter changes, sharpening blades, check tires, pull cords, lights, etc.


# Extreme Prey by John Sanford
