Confessions of a Fire House Santa

Mark Dickey is celebrating his 25th year as the Ripley Fire House Santa. If you ask him how he got into this, he'll tell you he was forced into it. He didn't want to be Santa, but someone had to do it. It was important! Now you couldn't tear him away from his appointed rounds with the children who come to see Santa.

"When Mrs. Claus and I get off that fire truck and walk through the door,



it's magic," Mark confessed. "We're like rock stars. The cheering really gets to us. (Saran Rotunda plays Mrs. Claus with Mark every year.

For some of these Ripley kids, the gifts they get from the fire house Santa is the only Christmas they'll have. When it first started twenty five years ago they got an orange and an apple, a candy cane, and a pencil. Now each child gets a hat and mittens, a book, and a bag filled with coloring books, crayons, colored pencils, perhaps a game or craft items.

At age ten or eleven, most kids "age out" of their belief in Santa. "Some kids recognize my voice," Mark said, "and one year I forgot to take off my ring and one little boy figured it out!" Santa reminds the older kids that they should let their younger siblings believe awhile longer. "They know I'm not really Santa, but they play along. It's like a good conspiracy."

Some children climb on his lap and tell him Santa isn't real. Mark invites them to touch him. "I'm real!" he tells them. One year, while playing Santa Claus at the library, he was asked if the facilities for the reindeer had been inspected lately. "Who would do those inspections?" Santa asked. "There's no land mass under the North Pole so it's in International Waters. Reindeer are my livelihood, so I take good care of them!"

In twenty five years Santa has seen the kids grow up to have children and grandchildren, and they all come to see Santa. He loves having the first Christmas photo taken with babies. By the time they turn two they are often afraid of Santa, but by three or four that fades away. The older kids and teenagers get to sit on Santa's knee, sometimes whether they want to or not. No stocking for those who refuse!

"There are two types of Santas," Mark revealed, "those that do it for the money, and those that 'get' it. I met a Santa at Chautauqua Mall once. He had the most luxurious beard I'd ever seen. He said it took him eight hours at the salon to get it looking that good! He gets it!"

Mark becomes a little emotional at times, talking about some of the kids he's seen over the years. There is one story that gets to him every year. Several years ago, as a paramedic, he answered a call where a seven year old girl had stopped breathing. "I got to the location and there was her mother, doing CPR on her little girl, literally pumping life back into her. I took over, and breathed for her until we got her to the hospital. She's a teenager now, but every year she comes to see me with her mom and little sister."

One year this little girl presented Mark with a photograph of her with a roll of Lifesavers taped to the bottom of the photo. It was three years before Mark could bring himself to put the picture on his wall and not cry.

Asked about the saddest experience he'd had as Santa, Mark told of a little boy whose only wish for Christmas was that Santa take away his mother's pain. "What do you say in a situation like that? I told him I'd see what I could do."

This year visits with Santa will be different due to the Covid-19 restrictions. Will Santa and Mrs. Claus wear masks? "Probably not," he says. But they will be distanced from the kids. No sitting on Santa's knee this year. There will be some sort of barrier around six feet away. Only one family at a time will be allowed into the fire hall, where they can talk briefly with Santa, snap a few pictures, get their stockings and gifts, and then leave for the next family to come in.

"Even with things the way they are now," says Mark, "It's a lot of fun. I wouldn't miss it!"
