After an extended Covid-19 and holiday break, construction has finally resumed at the library. The trim package has arrived and is being installed. Carpeting measurements have been done and will be ordered soon.

Three new doors are needed, one for the librarian's bell tower office, and two for closets under the new stairways.


Discussion is being held as to the original double doors leading

into both sides of the library. Keep them? Or start from scratch and replace all of them? No decision has yet been made.

Ceiling fans with remote controls to turn lights and/or fans on and off are also to be determined.

So much has

been done. So much more to do! An entirely NEW library is being created for our Ripley and surrounding area residents!

Friends of the Library Meeting: No February meeting scheduled

Construction, Back on Track, continued

Library Board President, Earl Freling, has been lending a helping hand with a project of his own: sanding and finishing the original support beams for the front corner of the library. Earl estimates that the hemlock beams were from a local tree that was over 500 years old. "I pulled hundred of nails out of the beams before I could even start sanding," Earl said.



This northwest corner of the reconstructed library will feature one of the round stained glass windows that adorned the Baptist church. Stripping, sanding, replacing glass and staining this window was another project Earl undertook.

The window will be back-lit and hung from the refurbished beams.

Balcony railings posts have gone up, as well as molding around the ceiling. Floor



beams for the balconies have been boxed in and will be

painted.

The original stained glass windows on the east side of the building will be opened up to the light and will extend to their original height, through the floor of the balcony.

Can lights are up and light fixtures are soon to follow. Things are moving along!


The library will now be open to the public on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, from 10a.m. until 3p.m. Sneak peaks at the progress will be given to patrons who stop in!







While the Ripley Library cannot restore the building to its original state, it's nice to see a photo of the Baptist Church as it looked in a by-gone era. The lower stained glass windows remain, one of the round windows in the peaks will be displayed in the library, and the steeple, without the spire, will be used as office space.



Future Changes


I would like to brief everyone on some upcoming changes for future finances of the Ripley Public Library. The board and I have been in contact with our library attorney and we need raise our tax base. We became a school district library in 2016. We have not raised our income from taxes for the those past five years. During this time we have seen three minimum wage increases, increased utilities and the increases in the costs of circulation materials for the library. At this point, we need to increase our income.

The estimated budget increase should be roughly two cent per thousand assessed value. I am very frugal with how money gets spent at the library but like anything else, costs go up. We will publish our new budget in the March newsletter along with a presentation date for any-

one with questions.

I also want to impress to you that this increase is **not** because of the renovations. The badly needed renovations to the library have been paid for through grants, fundraising from our wonderful "Friends of the Library" and generous donations from our supporters.

When the open house takes place, we invite you to come see your NEW library!

We have rebooted our plans for 2021, working remotely until we can once again safely meet in person at the library. Our objective is to complete our projects, to edit, design, and produce our books and host an Announcement Party by the end of 2021. Books will be produced as paperbacks. E-books will also be available if wanted. The costs are minimal for the project and should not deter anyone who wants to give it a try. Our members have different goals for their work. Some of us are working on memoirs, others fiction. Some just want to share family stories as a legacy for generations to come. (You don't have to be writing a book to be a member. All are welcome.)

If you would like to participate in the Ripley Writers Group, there are a couple ways you can do that. The Facebook page is a good start, but I am also available for one-on-one feedback via email and phone. We try to check in once a week and update each other. Our plan is subject to change, don't we know that now! But even with all the challenges,

we are hopeful that by the end of this year we will hold in our hands the books in our hearts.




