# Ripley Public Library Budget 2022

Five years ago the taxpayers of Ripley voted to make the library a school district library. In so doing, the income of the library is tied to property taxes. In the last several years the library has seen three increases in minimum wage, rising utility costs, and three break-ins that necessitated repairs.

The tax rate for the library has not increased in all that time. This year, however, we must ask for a small increase. An additional .02 cents per thousand of the assessed value per home, will give the library much needed funds to continue to serve the community. This is an incredibly small increase, and yet it will help the library so much!

The tax money that the library collects goes to salaries, the purchase of new materials, utilities and upkeep. That our library has a budget of less than \$90,000 per year in this economy is an amazing feat in itself, and is a testament to the frugality under which it operates. The librarian and Board of Directors work hard to maintain the quality of the library services while keeping costs down.

The proposed budget for 2022 is shown in its entirety on the next page. Please take a few minutes to look at the expenditures and income. The budget will be voted on in June at the library.

PLEASE NOTE: None of the expansion/renovation costs for the library have come from your tax dollars. Everything is being paid for with grant monies and donations.



This is the first real pandemic we have lived through and boy have we learned a lot. Here at the library we are in the middle of a huge renovation project. I can't wait to show it off to everyone. This will be a building the whole town can be proud of once it is complete. Somehow we have managed to stay open for limited use of the library, but as libraries do, we just keep plugging along and get books, movies and resources to people. Thank you to the



patrons who have supported us through this time.

Even though there is a pandemic going on and most of our resources are packed up in the storage container and elsewhere due

to a very giving community member, the library has remained busy behind the scenes. New books must be ordered and then they need to be covered. From there they have to be cataloged and added to the new book list.

This is a list we keep here and it gets put into the Bookworm to let you know the new titles coming this month. Our faithful patrons come in to borrow items and we are holding Book Club every





month. I have the annual report to do and as well as look for grants, the board meetings to prepare for and so many other everyday duties. So there is a lot that goes on here at the library even during a time of social distance and isolation.

We will need to increase our annual budget this year. We did very well for five years and we have not raised it, but we have absorbed rising costs, break-ins and three minimum wage hikes. This year reality has struck and we must increase our income. The good news is this will only affect the tax rates at about .02 per thousand. There can hardly be an argument about such a small increase and it is nice to know that anything invested in libraries will carry on for years to come.


I am looking forward to getting our books back in here and our shelves set up. We are looking for volunteers to help with this. This is a huge project, just like when we moved them out, but now we need to bring them back. I will need help first setting



up the bookshelves, then hauling the books and putting books on shelves. Phew! This renovating is exhausting. Hopefully when the time comes we will have folks who can help out. Please keep us in mind. Until then, I will see you at the library.

#### Construction Continues

It has occurred to those of us who are at the library daily, or at least several times a week, that we are not "renovating" the library; we are building an entirely NEW library! "Renovate" implies repairing and making something look new again. Our contractors are in fact changing the structure and function of our library. This new library being offered to the Ripley and area communities will not only house books, videos, and historic papers, but will provide space for student learning, a quiet reading room, a place for little ones to learn and be active, a designated area for our teens, a large screen television where videos can be viewed, programs watched, and classes taught remotely. Groups such as our sewing and quilting ladies will have designated areas for their projects, that won't have to be stored away each time. Ripley Writers Group will have space with tables and computers to hone their skills. The library will in fact, function as a community center. We are excited about this! When Phase I construction is completed in mid-April, come visit. See what the dedicated few have done for all of you.



## Launch Pads Are Available

Launch Pads are a learning tool which are available through the Chautauqua Cattaraugus Library System. These valuable items will help your child to learn, based on their age. They can be checked out by logging into the CCLS website and choosing which one you would like. These are expensive items and you will have to sign an agreement sheet that you will replace it if it becomes damaged. They are encased in a well-constructed case and is very sturdy. I would recommend them to anyone with small children.

If there is enough demand for them through the Ripley Library, we will consider buying a couple of them to have here at our home library. They are available for older learners too and have some for those who are studying for

## Adventures in Politicsland

#### The World is Watching

Did you know that the first published history of the American Revolution was written by a woman?

History of the Rise, Progress and Termination of the American Revolution by Mrs. Warren was published in 1805. Mercy Otis Warren's great grandfather (John Otis) was also my great (to some number of generations) grandfather making us distant cousins. But then, going back far enough, are we not all cousins?

I first became aware of Mercy from my second cousin, Reginal Holt Humphrey, who spent his life gathering genealogical information about our family. When my foray into politics ended in 2002, I finally had time to review his vast collection, and compiled a 600 page family history.

Reg wrote this paragraph included in my book. "Mercy Otis Warren, sister of James Otis was also active in the revolutionary movement in New England. It has been said that she and her brother were the two most responsible for the revolution." I wanted to know more.

The Otis family was immersed in politics, Mercy's father being the Speaker of the Massachusetts General Court\* and later Chief Justice. Her husband James Warren also served in the Mass. General Court, as did her brother James Otis, who was a renowned Boston lawyer. James Otis wrote the famous *Writs of Assistance*. We all remember from our school history books the phrase, "no taxation without representation." That was James' claim to fame.

During the revolution, many important political people lodged at the Warren's home in Barnstable, MA. She corresponded with John and Abigail Adams, George and Martha Washington, and many others involved in the struggle. And she kept meticulous notes. Her letters are archived at the Massachusetts historical society.

Mercy explained her purpose for writing the history. "I have used my pen with the liberty of one...who speaks to posterity—perhaps very far remote." Like so many historians, her noble cause was to objectively describe events for later generations...for us.

Remarkable is the fact that she was a highly educated woman who vigorously debated with those draft-

ing our new constitution. When her oratory brother James was beaten by a mob and unable to continue his efforts to incite the revolution, at the urging of her friends and family, she took up the cause. Newspapers published her political plays. She also wrote a pamphlet that was published as The Columbian Patriot. She wrote anonymously because, at that time, it wasn't acceptable for women to write or to be political. After the war, a man tried to take credit for her works, but none other than John Adams defended her and set the record straight. Her influence on John Adams and others helped prompt the addition of the Bill of Rights to the Constitution.

I often think of her as we struggle through our current political challenges. She wrote her history with hope, saying "From the revolutionary spirit of the times, the vast improvements in science, arts, and agriculture, the boldness of genius that marks the age, the investigation of new theories, and the changes in the political, civil, and religious characters of men, succeeding generations have reason the expect still more astonishing exhibitions."

We could say the same today. We just sent three machines to explore Mars! What more astonishing exhibitions will we witness?

Despite partisan divisions, she was hopeful. Her optimism inspires my own. "The United States form a young republic, a confederacy which ought ever to be cemented by a union of interest and affection under the influence of those principles which obtained their independence. These have indeed, at certain periods, appeared to be in the wane; but let them never be eradicated, by the jarring interests of parties, jealousies of the sister states, or the ambition of individuals."

We are cemented by what unites us, our common interests and love of our country. At times, our hearts may grow weary and our faith in our government may wane, but never will it be eradicated. I love this sentiment. Mercy recognized that political events would sometimes discourage us, but she believed, as do I, that we are a good people. Full of potential. We are a good nation.

Her words written over two hundred years ago still ring true: "The world is now viewing America, as experimenting a new system of government, a FED-ERAL REPUBLIC."

The world is still watching.

\*note: General Court is what we now call The House of Representatives in most state legislatures.

Marge traveled all over with her dear husband, Roger, and as she did so, she spread her signature love the world over too. Rest in peace, lovely lady.



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
