### Volunteerism at its finest...

Moving back into the library was a herculean task. Our ten volunteers formed a bucket brigade and in 2 1/2 hours brought roughly half the number of books and shelving into the library—all this while having worked an eight hour day in the vineyards! A second day was required to remove everything from Richard Eimers' building on Main Street, where he generously donated space for storage while construction continued.



Once the trailer was loaded they then had to unload the trailer and carry each box of books to their designated areas, some upstairs to the left, (arriba a la izquierda), some upstairs to the right (arriba a la derecho), and some just in the corner (recoveco).

Thousands of pounds of shelves, all broken down, had to be brought into the library, where they will be painstakingly put back together. (volunteers anyone?)

One of the existing doors on the front of the building was hanging by one hinge, so new doors



were installed on the Main Street side.

A focal point of the new library is the refurbished stained -glass window salvaged from the original Baptist church by Robyn Albright, who then sold it to Earl Freling. Earl painstakingly stripped layers of paint, replaced broken panes of glass, repainted and finished this priceless piece of memorabilia and donated it back to the library.

The Sneak Peek open house, which took place on Saturday, May 22nd, brought in 50 curious residents of not only Ripley but surrounding communities. Thank you to everyone who came out to see the progress. Anticipated full time opening will be the end of June, after all the

shelves and books are put back in place. See you then!





# Ripley Public Library Budget Vote

 Budget Vote to be held Tuesday, June 8th, 2021, at the library.

### **Please Note:**

There has been no increase in tax revenue for the library in 5 years.

The proposed increase amount is \$0.02 per thou sand of home assessed value.

Example: \$50,000 home will pay \$1.00 in additional tax, annually, to fund the library.

No renovation costs have come from tax revenue

Maintenance of the building, including outside maintenance, DOES come from tax revenue.

 Two Library Board seats to be filled, one currently held by Linda Lowes, one currently vacant.
 Candidates are Linda Lowes and Linda Probst.

The entire book is the history, present day activities and projected future of one county in Kansas, Chase County.


The author broke the county into 9 quadrants and traveled each by car, by horseback and by foot, met, interviewed and spent time with some of the oldest remaining settlers or their descendants.

They talked of the hardships, the natural disasters, the railroads and agricultural changes they have seen and lived through. Some the memories shared were heartbreaking, some hilarious and others thought provoking.

They visited cafes resurrected from old stage coach stations and toured the remains of towns built, lived in and abandoned over the years.

They investigated areas mentioned in the stories of cattle drives, such as the best water hole on the trail, the cave where men and animals could shelter in a storm. Interspersed throughout the book

are writings from travelers, hunters and trappers and professors of history, all written in the 1800's.






