



Cattaraugus Library System (CCLS) the library will now have its own collection of titles. Currently in the collection are the following:



Ripley Public Library Has Become a Safe Place Location

What is a Safe Place Location, you might ask. A Safe Place works with the Safe House out of Jamestown and is part of Chautauqua Opportunities, Inc. This is a program for runaway or homeless youth under the age of 18. If this youth needs help, all they do is enter the facility with the yellow sign that reads SAFE PLACE. They let someone in charge know they need help. The person in charge will contact the Safe Place Agency and someone will come out to talk with the youth. This counselor will talk with the youth, provide shelter and transportation if necessary.



Even though the year 2021 shut down many businesses and venues due to Covid-19, the Ripley Public Library soldiered on. Construction resumed on the renovations in February, while books were ordered online or by telephone and delivered to patrons in their cars.

In May the shelves and books, as well as furniture, were moved back into the building. It took three months to put everything back into place, including the thousands of books.

A smaller than usual Book Sale took place in August, giving people a sneak peek at the changes made to the library, and the Grand Re-opening was held in September to great reviews.

As part of the new programming for the library, the first Author's Night was held in September as well. The hope is to feature a local author every other month.

The Annual Auction in November took place for the second year on-line, and was a great success.

After a year of construction and confusion, the year ended with a wonderful Christmas in Ripley celebration which included a Vendor/Crafters Sale held in the library.
