

Be Kind Initiative

We often despair that nothing will ever change. No one cares. Our young people are content to sit on the sidelines and not get involved, and don't care to work. And it often takes a tragedy to initiate a change.

Such a change is coming about through a tragedy here in Ripley. In 2018 a young man, Owen Miller, took his own life in response to the bullying he endured at the hands of other young people. Be Kind Initiative was born of that heart-wrenching event.

The Mission Statement of Be Kind Initiative is as follows:

"As a community nonprofit, we focus on connecting with our community and helping those in need. We work with the community and schools to help people and students who are struggling day to day. We assist schools with antibullying projects and do community drives to help families and people in need. We want to change the world with one act of kindness a day, big or small."

Kristian Snyder and Kasey Conley, two local young people, organized a group to initiate positive change. Initially with the guidance of Ripley's Methodist church, they set about to organize an anti-bulling campaign in our communities. Now a stand-alone non-profit, they have reached out to three school districts and over 500 students.

"We went into Chautauqua Lake School and did a project with the students, making magnets with positive sayings on them, like "You are Enough," "Be Kind," and "Kindness Counts," and we talk about community service and discuss topics about how to make a positive difference," Kristian explained.

"We're just getting started," Kristian continued, "but it's more than just an anti-bullying program. We reach out with community service as well. We are the ones who put together the Blessing Bags that are available at the Methodist Church (in Ripley).

These bags are filled with mostly hygiene items such as toothbrushes, combs, soap and are free to those in need. Some people are embarrassed to be seen taking the bags, so we put them in a discreet place," he continued. "At first we lost some to kids just messing around and taking them, but we think we have that mostly resolved."

As the seasons change, so do the contents of the Blessing Bags. The money to buy the products given away comes partially from donations and from various fund-raisers, such as the Shoe Drive that is ongoing until early April. Donations of shoes, in ANY condition, can be made at the Ripley Library. The upcoming Wine Dash at 21 Brix Winery on Saturday, May 6th will partner with Be More Fitness to raise funds for local nonprofits, including Be Kind Initiative. A collection for items for the Blessing Bags will be taken at that time.

In the mean time, let's have some fun with April Fools Day. As many of you know, I love a good harmless practical joke. April Fools Jokes have been played for centuries, I guess humor is just born into us. Which is why we played this prank on our readers this year. I am wondering if anyone picked up on it.

Origins of April Fools' Day

Some historians speculate that April Fools' Day dates back to 1582, when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar, as called for by the Council of Trent in 1563. In the Julian Calendar, as in the Hindu calendar, the new year began with the spring equinox around April 1. People who were slow to get the news or failed to recognize that the start of the new year had moved to January 1 and continued to celebrate it during the last week of March through April 1 became the butt of jokes and hoaxes and were called "April fools." These pranks included having paper fish placed on their backs and being referred to as "poisson d'avril" (April fish), said to symbolize a young, easily caught fish and a gullible person.

There are other accounts that date this

back even further. I just like it and have fun with it every year. My family is so used to it though that I have a hard time pranking them.

Anyway, read on to see the prank that was done in London way back in 1749.

Prankster in a Bottle

In January of 1749, London newspapers advertised that in an upcoming show, a man would squeeze his entire body into a wine bottle and then sing while inside of it. The ad promised that, "during his stay in the bottle, any Person may handle it, and see plainly that it does not exceed a common Tavern Bottle." The ad promised the show would feature other tricks as well, including communicating with the dead. Legend has it that the ad was the result of a bet between the Duke of Portland and the Earl of Chesterfield, Reportedly, the duke bet that he could advertise something impossible and still "find fools enough in London to fill a playhouse and pay handsomely for the privilege of being there." And apparently, he was right. The night of the show, every seat in the house was filled, but no performer ever showed up. Realizing they had been duped, the audience rioted.




We Need Your Help!
