FROM the DESK of the RIPLEY TOWN HISTORIAN

The following is a letter from Betsey Youngs Fales, who sent me her memoirs of attending the one-room school house at State Line.

It was the day before Thanksgiving vacation, November 1939, when I began my formal education. I remember the date because my mother's friend stopped for a visit and in conversation with Mom, she turned to me and said, "Weren't you the smart one to begin school the day before a vacation!" How did it happen that I should have been enrolled in first grade at the age of five?

The one room school house where I was enrolled stood next door to our family home. Because of the close proximity to home it was easy for me, a fiveyear-old with a curious mind, to visit the school on a daily basis. Usually I would wander into the school around 10:00 am and stay until the school day ended. The teacher did not object. In fact, it was his idea that my mother might legally enroll me in school, provided the school district superintendent would approve. Prior to enrollment I was to take a test written on the slate board at school, to determine whether I was ready to begin school at five. I do

not remember what the test involved but I remember writing answers on the chalk board. All parties—mother, teacher and superintendent, agreed that I was ready to become a registered student, raising the school student population from eleven to twelve.

The school house was a white clapboard building with large windows on three sides. Students entered into a long narrow entry room where we hung our coats on wooden pegs, placed our lunch buckets and winter boots/ galoshes under the benches on either side of the entry room. At one end of the entry there was a trap door leading into an earthen hand dug cellar. Coal was delivered to the basement to be used for heating the school house during winter months. A pot bellied stove was strategically located in the center of the classroom area of the building. On cold winter days we would heat soup on that stove.

The school did have electricity but it has no running water.

The restroom facility, called the outhouse, was a small white building located near the back of the school. Students would indicate outhouse usage by turning the sign located on the front chalkboard ledge from "free" to "in use." I cannot remember using the outhouse in the winter months. Did I have to wear a coat and boots to make the outdoor trip?

Without water there was no washing of hands after outhouse use. Sanitation in a country school was not a high priority back in 1939.

Students each had their own desk. Desks were wooden and had sloped lift tops and an inkwell in the upper right side of the desk top. Decorative trim and desk legs were made of wrought iron. Attached to the desk was a wooden bench with back. Desks came in different sizes to accommodate the variation in student sizes from grade one to grade eight. Although I had my own desk, I spent most of my first grade seated beside me friend, Marjorie, another first grader. As we sat side by side, it was Marjorie who taught me to read. The book characters were Mother, Father, Dick, Jane, Sally and Spot the dog. Over the years I have met many adults who learned to read using that same series.

After a few weeks in school, I took my reading home to show my mother what I had learned. After reading the entire book, my mother said, "That is very good, Betsey, but the book is upside down."

My first classroom teacher was Mr. VerHague. At the back of the classroom area, Mr. VerHague built a mock bank and grocery store. Each student had their own bank book to use for depositing or withdrawing monies. We used this play money to buy things from the grocery store. Since we did not use ink for writing (the glass ink jars had been removed from the desks) we were allowed to use the inkwell hole as a mailbox. Writing notes to friends was encouraged. Once each week a student was assigned to be banker, storekeeper or postman.

A rope swing hung from the enormous maple tree in the grassy plot at the front of the school house. Apart from the swing, students used their imaginations for play during recess. When springtime arrived, out came the jump ropes, marbles and jacks. We playe kick the can, hide and seek, rover-red rover, farmer in the dell—to name a few.

Once each week the physical edustruct us in exercise and structured games. Most gym classes were held outside. We were instructed in art and music each week, also by the in-town teachers. I had Coach Johnson as the physical education teacher from grades 1-12. I can still hear him reminding me to stand tall, with shoulders back. He kept after me for twelve years about my posture.

A new teacher, Mrs. Dean, came to our school at the beginning of third grade. Mr. VerHague, I learned later, was drafted into the armed services. I especially remember Mrs. Dean because she encouraged me to stop biting my fingernails. She promised me a manicure if I would allow my nails to grow. Her attentions worked and one afternoon I sat at her desk while she filed my nails and painted them with clear polish. I was so proud!

Academic instruction escapes me. I have little or no recollection of the teacher instructing me in any one subject. My friend, Margorie, age six, was my reading teacher. I must have heard lessons being taught to the older students, but I have no recollection of details.

Late in the fall of my third year, cation teacher came out from town to in- the new central school was completed in Ripley. All of the one room schoolhouses were closed and the building sold. Since my school was located on the family property, my father bought the building and for the next few years I had my own school house. After school and weekends I would invite the neighborhood kids over to play school. Since it was my school house, I always got to be the teacher!

> To this day the building still stands next to the family home. The property has gone out of the family and the school house is now a rental home. But each year on the annual visit back to Ripley, when I drive past that little one room schoolhouse, my heart fills with nostalgia for those happy carefree few years of my childhood.



Please be advised there are two different programs. Mobile Food Pantry (at the fire hall) has no income requirement. Feed More WNY (in the school building) income guidelines are listed above.
