Repeating History at Your Local Library

Libraries contribute so much more than books to the communities they serve. Here at the Ripley Library we have countless sources of information for those willing to explore. Herein is another bit of history found in the Reference section.

From the book *Reflections, 19th Century Gravestones of Chautauqua County, New York,* just in time for Halloween, we can explore the meaning of those pretty pieces of artwork on old gravestones.

"Gravestones say a great deal not only about another era and its people, but about this era and ourselves. The ability to interpret grave markers of past generations teaches one a great deal about humanity in general....Cemeteries are not just places where people are buried, but rather outdoor libraries and museums. Behind every gravestone waits a wonderful story ready to be told."

Types of motifs of the 19th century:

"One of the earliest motifs found during the 19th century was the winged skull. This icon represented the ethic that death was inevitable and would come to all. As religious dogma changed, the winged skull motif was taken over by the chubby faced cherub. In general they symbolized the presence of God and resurrection.

"The rising or setting sun was a transitional geometric icon denoting either the ending of earthly life or the beginning of life in Heaven.

"The hourglass was another popular motif. This icon expressed the running out of time, and the ending of life.

"The lamb was symbolic of sweetness, innocence and also Christ. This motif was mostly found on children's gravestones.

"Birds were frequently used to symbolize human souls, going back to Egyptian times.

"Floral wreaths indicated eternity because of their circular form. There was no beginning nor end to this shape. Wreaths were also expressive of celebration, mourning and resurrection."

The book shows various gravestones around Chautauqua that demonstrate these motifs as well as many, many more. Next time you visit a cemetery, take a look at the old stones and see if you can interrupt the meaning behind the designs. Read the messages inscribed in the stone, or come to the library and research the various types of designs and what they mean.

I lie here with the silent dead, The living walk around my head:

Tis soon with me you all must lie,

Till we ascend with Christ on high."

Ripley Public Library Has Become a Safe Place Location

What is a Safe Place Location, you might ask. A Safe Place works with the Safe House out of Jamestown and is part of Chautauqua Opportunities, Inc. This is a program for runaway or homeless youth under the age of 18. If this youth needs help, all they do is enter the facility displaying the yellow sign that reads SAFE PLACE. They let someone in charge know they need help. The person in charge will contact the Safe Place Agency and someone will come out. This counselor will talk with the youth, provide shelter and transportation if necessary.
