Book Review by Diane O'Brien

"MARY'S WORLD" Written by Richard Cote

Love, War, and Family Ties in Nineteenth-century Charleston

Mary's World is an historical memoir taking place in nineteenth century Charleston, South Carolina. Mary Motte Alston Pringle was educated and wealthy. Her husband, William, was a wealthy rice planter who owned four plantations and 337 slaves. Mary and William had 13 children, all reaching adulthood.

During the Civil War, two sons were killed and one driven insane. The family slaves were freed. Mary tells in her own words taken from 2,500 pages of her handwritten letters, journals and diaries of the joys, sorrows, and terrors her family faced.

Readers also learn the different lifestyles, food, clothing, and experiences of the slaves and tells of Cretia, her favorite servant and her husband Scipio.

Mary was a woman of great intelligence and learning. She was forced to live out her dreams vicariously through her sons while she watched her daughters become imprisoned by the same rules that prevented her from achieving her own potential.

Book Review by Michelle Henry "Legends of the Chautauqua-Erie Grape Belt" by John Thomas Slater, 2023

The author, John T. Slater, credits Ripley's own Marie McCutcheon for encouraging him to write this book. Slater memorializes Marie, who, as Ripley Historian, made her own archives available to him and connected him with other local resources. Slater's previous research and writing about the Nickel Plate Railroad naturally segued into the history of the grape belt. Without the railroads, our grape industry would not have flourished. This book provides a comprehensive overview of the key factors that made our region the oldest and largest Concord grapegrowing region in the world.

This is not just a history of grape growing. Slater explains how the climate and topography of Lake Erie's southern shore was created by receding glaciers during the Pleistocene epoch, creating an environment well-suited for the grapes that would be introduced by our early settlers. From the early cultivation of grapes, to the creation of a fresh grape market (made possible by the railroad), to the arrival of Dr. Welch and his unfermented grape juice, and culminating in today's thriving wine industry, Slater introduces the reader to the people and events that have driven our viticultural economy for almost 200 years. Ripley readers also may be interested in the chapter on mechanized grape harvesting since one of the first three successful harvesters was due to the vision of Ripley native Roy Orton.

This book was produced by Western New York Heritage, Inc. (publishers of the award-winning Western New York Heritage magazine), who have created a visually beautiful volume filled with lush colorful images from the many local archival collections that the author accessed. This book is lovely to look at.

John Slater spent ten years researching the grape belt, collaborating with many local historians and historical societies from Erie County, PA and Chautauqua County. His substantial collection of research material has been donated to the Barker Museum in Fredonia and is available to researchers as the Lake Erie Grape Belt History Project Archive.

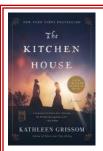

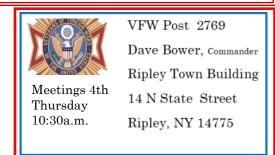

The Planting Month

May is the month to plant so I thought it might be nice to put some information out there for folks who might be new to planting.

First of all, what is the difference between a perennial and an annual? Perennials are the plants that keep coming back year after year. They usually seed themselves and propagate easily. Annuals are the plants we sow every year. These must be replaced every year. I like to plant both around my house. The perennials come back and I do not have to do too much with them, however, many of them do not bloom for long and when they are gone, they are gone until next year. The annuals are the colorful flowers we fill in around the perennials. Once planted they will continue to bloom until the frost hits. As you can see, both types of flowers can be conducive to your landscape.

Let's talk about some common perennials.

Peonies are a popular flower and they live for generations. Their leaves are a dark glossy green with deep cuts. This foliage reddens in the fall, giving off the beautiful Autumn colors we all love. The main attraction is the large showy blooms in pink, white and red. Sometimes the plants produce double blooms and need to be staked up due to the weight of the blossoms. These flowers bloom mid-to-late spring and are popular in Spring wedding bouquets.



Hostas are another perennial many people love. They fill in space and produce a white -to-purple flower. The foliage can be a variety of colors from dark green to light yellow and even a tinge of blue. They are hardy and tough as nails. If you are one of those who kill every plant you touch, this is the one for you as it will defy any attempt on its life.

Black-eyed Susans are a popular native flower. Sturdy stems bear cheerful

golden daisy-like blooms with a black cone-like center. These are late starters though and do not begin blooming until late summer. However, there is a variety you can buy called the "Early Bird Gold", very similar to the common "Goldstrum". It will begin blooming early and won't stop until frost. Around here, you can plan on blooms from late June to October.

The last plant I am writing about is the **Foxglove.** (Digitalis purpurea) It is a tall plant with tubular flowers. They look a little like trumpets and are often placed in the back of a garden due to their height. These flowers are deer and rabbit resistant. Common foxglove is biennial, meaning they only bloom every two years, but they are excellent at reseeding themselves. There is a note I want to make about the foxglove: they





are highly poisonous. As you will notice, I put the scientific name in parenthesis. Take notice of the first word *digitalis*. This plant is used to make heart medicine. Use caution when decorating with this plant. Additionally, foxglove is not native to North America and may be considered an invasive species in your area.

I hope you enjoyed this little bit of information on plants.

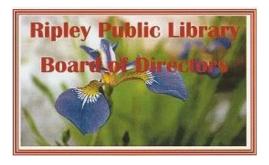

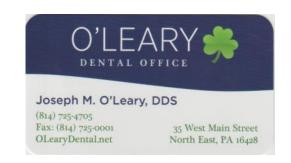

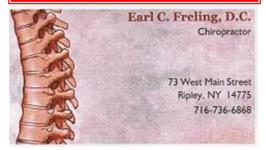
